Food Insecurity Data

What is food insecurity?

- USDA measurement of a lack of consistent access, at times, to enough food for an active, healthy life
- *Hunger* refers to a personal, physical sensation of discomfort at the individual level
- Food insecurity refers to a lack of available financial resources for food at the household level

Poverty & Food Insecurity

 According to the USDA, one-third of food insecure households live above 185% of the poverty line

Food-Insecure Individuals and Income Eligibility, 2017¹ 29% **Charitable Response** ABOVE 185% **OF POVERTY Government Programs** like Child Nutrition, WIC 19% SNAP 130% TO 185% OF POVERTY 51% BELOW 130% **OF POVERTY**

Food Insecurity is Complex

Food Insecurity Rates from USDA

Nationally

- 1 in 9 households (11%) in the United States encountered difficulty at some time during 2018 in providing enough food for their family
- 37 million Americans, including 11 million children
- Lowest rate since before the recession

Connecticut

• 12% of all households, still higher than 11% in 2008

Map the Meal Gap

- County-level food insecurity estimates by income categories
- An estimate of the food budget shortfall that food insecure individuals report

About 118,000 people in Hartford and Tolland counties are food insecure, including 33,000 children

MAP THE MEAL GAP

Food Insecurity in Greater Hartford

- About 15% of children are food insecure, compared to 11% among the general population
- An estimated 42% of the food insecure population have incomes too high to qualify for most federal nutrition programs
- A person who is food insecure is estimated to need, on average, \$18.37 more per week to buy just enough food to meet their needs

Hunger Among Adults Age 50-59

- At the state level, Connecticut has 5th highest rate of food insecurity for this age group in 2017 at 16%
- At the metro level, ranks the Hartford area as the #1 highest rate of food insecurity for this age group in 2017 at 20%

Evaluation Advice: BHN

- 1. Select key evaluation questions. (what do you need to know?)
- 2. Systematically collect data.



Evaluation Advice: BHN

Determine targets in advance. (How good is good 3. enough?) External Standards



Best Professional Hunch Lbs. of food provided Number of clients served Number who did not skip meals Percent who used food savings for rent

- 4. Analyze, summarize and share findings.
- 5. Use findings to inform next steps.

Chrysalis Center Review of Incident Reports

- Service staff required to report on all client incidents (e.g., medical & psychiatric hospitalizations, arrests, incarceration, deaths, serious injury)
- Most incident categories have a sub category of substance abuse
- Incident reports reviewed quarterly by CQI department for trends
- Recommendations made for improvements





FY19 Incidents Involving Substance Abuse

- 1. Changed Risk Assessment Level to move chronic substance abuse participants to Risk Level 3
- 2. Increased case management services for those with Level 3 Risk
- 3. Monthly trainings and case conference with Substance Abuse clinical professional

We learned more about who are clients were and received feedback verifying they needed and were grateful for our assistance.



Mobile Foodshare Client Surveys 2018

Optional survey administered immediately before and during food distribution at 25 of 67 sites

Surveyed 1,956 attendees (65% response rate) in English, Spanish and Polish



Tips:

- ✓ Involve program staff early on
- ✓ Want to know vs. need to know
- ✓ Test survey tool
- ✓ Logistics are key
- Client experience: timing, messaging, language, incentives
- Clients want to contribute and feel heard
- ✓ BEC support

Highlights from responses:

- •63% with senior(s) in household
 •59% reported not receiving SNAP
 •70% reported not visiting other pantries
 •77% visit Mobile truck every two weeks
 •51% know someone in need who is unable to get to Mobile Foodshare site
 •Customer service experience
 •Top requested items: vegetables, fruit
- Top requested items: vegetables, fruit and meats
